THE VISION

- Canada is a global beacon of human rights.
- Goal: Permanent Residence
- Goal: Citizenship
- Goal: Safety from persecution

THE REALITY

- The journey is fraught with complexity.
- Challenge: Housing costs at record highs
- Challenge: Strict budgeting required
- Challenge: Legal intricacies

Key Insight: Success requires more than just arriving; it requires exceptional planning and community support.

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Know your status to understand your rights.

The system operates on two distinct tracks—do not confuse them.

Track 1: Resettlement Program



- **Selection:** Outside Canada (UNHCR)
- **Status upon arrival:** Permanent Resident
- **Support:** Immediate government support (GARs)

This guide focuses on the In-Canada Asylum Process.



Track 2: In-Canada Asylum Program



- **Selection:** Arrive at border/airport to claim
- **Status upon arrival:** Claimant (until accepted)
- **Requirement:** Must prove claim to the IRB



The In-Canada Asylum Roadmap



Phase 1: Entry & Claim

Port of Entry or Inland Claim. Obtaining the RPCD.



Phase 2: The Waiting Period

Medical Exams, Work Permits, and Legal Aid.



Phase 3: The Hearing & Decision

Testimony before the IRB and the final ruling.

Phase 1: The Claim and the “Anchor” Document

- 1. Declare Intent:** Tell the CBSA officer you fear persecution. (Note: Passport will be confiscated).

- 2. Eligibility:** Receive the Refugee Protection Claimant Document (RPCD). This is your primary ID.

CRITICAL WARNING

The Basis of Claim (BOC) form must be submitted within 15 days for inland claims.

This is the most important document in your life. It outlines your fear of persecution. Errors here are fatal.

Phase 2: Action items during the waiting period

Do not wait for your hearing to start your life.



Medical Exam

Complete the IME within 30 days to trigger Interim Federal Health Program (IFHP) coverage.



Work Permit

Apply for an Open Work Permit immediately. (2026 processing time: approx. 1-2 months).




Legal Aid

Secure a lawyer immediately. Claimants with counsel have significantly higher acceptance rates.

Strategic Geography: Choosing where to settle

While major cities offer support, mid-sized communities often offer the best financial balance.



Housing costs vary drastically across these regions. Choose wisely.

The Major Metros: High support, high cost

Toronto & Southern Ontario



Pros: Multicultural, high demand for general labour.

Cons: Critical Housing Challenge. Shelter allowance covers <50% of rent. Shared housing is mandatory.

Montreal (Quebec)



Pros: Vibrant European lifestyle, robust support (PRAIDA), manufacturing jobs.

Cons: Language Barrier. You MUST learn French for success.

The Alternatives: Financial independence and community

Calgary & Edmonton (Alberta)



Focus: Financial Independence.

Economy driven by agriculture and warehousing. Higher RAP rates relative to rent allow families to stabilize faster.

Atlantic Canada (Halifax & Moncton)



Focus: Social Inclusion.

Quiet, safe, strong sponsorship presence. Affordable rent—it is possible to rent a whole apartment here.

The Financial Reality (2026 Data)

The gap between government support (RAP) and rent.

| City | Monthly RAP Allowance (Single) | Avg Rent (Room) | Gap |
|-----------|--------------------------------|-----------------|--------|
| Toronto | ~\$1,100 | ~\$1,200 | -\$100 |
| Vancouver | ~\$1,150 | ~\$1,300 | -\$150 |
| Calgary | ~\$1,000 | ~\$900 | +\$100 |
| Montreal | ~\$950 | ~\$850 | +\$100 |

Key Takeaway: In Toronto and Vancouver, you start in a deficit. In Calgary, the math works in your favor.

Surviving the 'RAP Gap' and System Backlogs

Challenge: The Money

Resettlement Assistance Program rates are based on social welfare, not market costs.

STRATEGY

- Use food banks **aggressively**.
- Share housing.
- Transition to work permit income ASAP.

Challenge: The Wait

Wait times for hearings can range from 12 to 24 months.

STRATEGY

- Do not pause your life.
- Focus on 'Establishment': Learn English, volunteer, work.
- This aids your case if an H&C appeal is needed later.





You have rights while you wait.



Healthcare

Covered by the Interim Federal Health Program (IFHP)—includes basic medical, emergency dental, and vision.



Work

Right to apply for an Open Work Permit once eligible.



Protection

Protection from return to your home country (Non-refoulement) while the claim is processing.

Critical Rules & Frequently Asked Questions

Q: Can I claim asylum at the US land border?

A: Generally, no. The Safe Third Country Agreement limits this unless you meet specific exceptions.

Q: Can I visit my home country?

A: NO. Returning suggests you do not fear persecution. Canada may revoke your status ('Cessation').

Q: How long until I get Permanent Residence?

A: You apply for PR after the IRB accepts your claim. Processing takes another 20+ months.

The Risk of Error

The Danger

A refugee claim is a life-or-death legal proceeding.



Common Pitfalls

- Contradictions in dates or details within the Basis of Claim (BOC) form.
- Poorly explained narratives.



Consequence: These errors destroy credibility and can lead to deportation. Your story must be heard clearly and correctly.
